

Dental Crowns Coquitlam

A crown (cap) is a dental fixture that restores the anatomical surfaces of a cracked or injured tooth to their original function. The anatomical surfaces are the segments of the tooth that are visible above the periodontal line.

Usually, reconstructive crowns are only given when there is a really large portion of remaining tooth to build off of. The materials used have need of ample surface area to successfully bond with the dental binding material, or the crowns may require frequent refurbishing.

A tooth fixture is prepared prior to a crown being permanently bonded on. This restorative process is often an oral health professionals favored treatment preference for the reason that it creates a sturdy and permanent restoration with a high level of cosmetic appeal.

The two most accepted kinds of dental crowns used today are porcelain fused to metal and a ceramic jacket crown. Crowns with ceramic fused to metal are typically used on back molars because they offer superior durability and strength during actions like biting and chewing. The face or veneer of the crown is built of porcelain materials that provide a natural and organic look. The ceramic jacket crowns are made of a slim metallic casing enclosed by numerous layers of ceramic materials to help complement the shadings of a natural tooth. This type of fixture is only used on the front teeth.
